WHY MARAZION?

The ancient market town of Marazion is, not surprisingly, a place of pcturesque streets with galleries and gift shops. Cornwall's oldest town looks out to Mount's Bay, and is by far the best place to see iconic St Michael's Mount which sits just 500 meters from the coast.

The South West Coast Path runs through the town and the RSPB nature reserve is home to Cornwall's largest reed bed and an abundance of plants and birds.

LOCAL ATTRACTIONS



ST MICHAEL'S MOUNT

Marazion

Hop on a boat or walk across the causeway during low tide to a community where modern life meets over a thousand years of history, with the oldest buildings on the island dating back to the 12th century.

POLGOON VINEYARD

Penzance

JUBILEE POOL

Penzance

The UK's largest, most celebrated art deco sea water lido and geothermally heated pool.

CHAPEL STREET

TATE ST. IVES

St. Ives

Discover 100 years of art celebrating how West Cornwall has welcomed and inspired artists, and revealing new connections to artists from around the World. Includes work by Alfred Wallis, Marlow Moss, and Barbara Hepworth.



ISLES OF SCILLY

An archipelago off the southwestern tip of Cornwall. Sail on the Scillonian, or fly via helicopter or the Skybus from Landsend, Newquay or Exeter. With only five inhabited islands, over 100 or so more provide a safe haven for wildlife and seabirds.



NEWLYN FILMHOUSE

Newlyn

Newlyn Filmhouse is a two screen independent cinema, converted from a 1876 granite built, fish cellar and smokery. The venue also includes a cafe bar serving cocktails, coffee and everything in between.

LOCAL ATTRACTIONS



TINTAGEL CASTLE
Tintagel

Immerse yourself in history, myth and stunning scenery at Tintagel Castle on Cornwall's rugged north coast. Inextricably linked with the legend of King Arthur, for centuries this dramatic castle and coastline has fired the imaginations of writers and artists alike.



THE EDEN PROJECT

Bodelva

The project is located in a reclaimed china clay pit, found approximately three miles from St Austell. The attraction is home to the world's largest rainforest in captivity with steamy jungles and waterfalls.



PORTHGWARRA COVE

A pituresque fishing cove in West Cornwall. This scenic place is the ultimate hideaway and was also a Poldark filming location. Plenty of rockpools to explore and tunnels to discover. Find Porthgwarra Cafe at the top of the slipway.



TREMENHEERE GARDENS

Penzance

In a sheltered valley overlooking St Michael's Mount; the woods, stream and dramatic vistas provide the perfect setting for large scale exotic and sub tropical planting at Tremenheere Sculpture Gardens.



THE LOST GARDENS OF HELIGAN

Saint Austell

Lost to the brambles of time since the outbreak of WW1, this sleeping beauty was reawakened in 1990 to become Europe's largest garden restoration project. Heligan's two hundred acres are a paradise for the explorer and wildlife lover.



THE SEAL SANCTUARY Gweek

The Cornish Seal Sanctuary is a charity that rescues and rehabilitates grey seal pups from around the Cornish coastline. They rescue over seventy seal pups each season that they

Penzance

The Minack Theatre is Cornwall's world famous open air theatre, carved into the granite cliff and set in glorious gardens overlooking the spectacular panorama of Porthcurno Beach. Advance booking essential.

CORNISH BEACHES

MARAZION BEACH

Simply relaxing and soaking up the atmosphere of this enchanting beach is pleasure enough but with windsurfing, kitesurfing, jet skiing and sailing all on offer, there is plenty to keep even the most energetic busy. There are rock pools to explore around Chapel Rock and Marazion Harbour, and a well equipped play park is situated just above the beach.

PRAA SANDS 5 miles

When you take the short walk from the car park to Praa Sands, you'll be struck by how white the sand is, blinding so in the sunshine. Apparently, and here's the science, the light sand is made from seashells that have been pulverised by wave action over millions of years.

Located in the south west facing bend between the Lizard and West Penwith, the mile long sandy beach is backed with sheltering sand dunes and its easily accessible position is enjoyed by families having fun in the shallows.

PORTHMEOR 9 miles

Situated in the shadow of the iconic Tate St Ives Gallery, Porthmeor is a sandy, safe beach, popular with surfers and swimmers alike. Its an ideal location just a stone's throw from the centre of St Ives, where you'll find shops, pubs, cafes and lots of art galleries that the town is famous for.

PEDN VOUNDER 11 miles

Pedn Vounder is located at the eastern end of the bay that makes up Porthcurno Cove, and on a spring low tide one can walk to Pedn Vounder from neighbouring Porthcurno Beach. Always check the tide times before setting out.

Over recent years the beach here has ceased to be the secret spot it once was. Having become something of a poster child for Cornwall's most stunning beaches, it has featured in national newspapers and is now well and truly on the tourist bucket list.

PORTHCURNO 12 miles

Described by some as being a paradise, Porthcurno Beach, located in the far west of Cornwall has won many awards and it's easy to see why. With gorgeous fine soft white sand washed by a sea that turns turquoise in the sun, and high cliffs on both sides providing shelter. It's and oasis of stunning natural beauty.

PORTHTOWAN BEACH 18 miles

Located within a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, this Blue Flag award winning beach is one of Cornwall's most popular surfing beaches; bordered by soft golden sand and backed by large dunes, dramamtic cliffs and The Unicorn on the Beach. From the beach, at low tide, you can walk to the neighbouring and equally stunning beach at Chapel Porth to the east.

KYNANCE COVE 20 miles

Located on the west side of the Lizard and probably the most photographed and painted location in Cornwall, the contrast between the cove's white sand beach and the dark red and green serpentine rock produces a breathtaking sight. At low tide you can explore the towering rock stacks and the caves with names such as The Parlour and The Drawing Room.

FISTRAL BEACH 20 miles

As one of the world's top surfing destinations, Fistral is the playground for hundred of enthusiasts who flock to the beach to get a fix of the big waves. On shore there are plenty of opportunities to book surf lessons or hire gear and a complex of cafes, takeaways and shops is located on the beach. Or you can just lie on the beach and watch the action from afar.

WATERGATE BAY 33 miles

Two miles of golden sand at low tide stretches towards Newquay and out to sea. Enormous waves come in from the Atlantic providing a spectacular sight at this popular surfing and kitesurfing spot. It is a large, open bay that frequently picks up swell from the Atlantic and is popular with families and surfers.

At certain times of the year there are restrictions on when dogs are allowed on the beach. For the most up to date information please visit cornwall.gov.uk and search "dogs on beaches".











EXPLORING THE COAST



PORTHGWARRA TO PORTHCURNO

2.3 miles Moderate Walk TR19 6JR to TR19 6JX

After a modest climb out of Porthgwarra, with some scrambling between granite boulders, there is a fairly level walk over the clifftops as far as Porth Chapel. You then cross the valley before resuming along the clifftop as far as the Minack Theatre. Finally a steep climb takes you down to the idyllic beach at Porthcurno.



MARAZION TO PENZANCE

2.7 miles Easy Walk TR17 0EN to TR18 2LT

An easy walk from Penzance, or Marazion, that gives great views across Mount's Bay to St Michael's Mount, the Lizard and Mousehole. It is especially good in Autumn, when the Bird Reserve at Marazion attracts rare migrants such as Bitterns and Water Rails, and the flocks of Swallows hunting flying ants sometimes draw the attention of a passing Hobby, an unusual bird of prey.



MARAZION TO PERRANUTHNOE

3.3 miles Easy Walk TR17 0EN to TR20 9NP

Coast path along the beach, through dunes, on pavements, lanes and footpaths. Level walking throughout apart from one gentle uphill section. Please note, there are pinch points along the route and so it is not accessible for pushchairs. After making your way through the picturesque streets of Marazion, with it's galleries, shops and tearooms, the coast path pulls out around the edge of Mount's Bay and past the old mine workings at Trenow.



PERRANPORTH TO ST AGNES

3.8 miles Moderate Walk TR6 OGS to TR5 ORS

Most of the walk is fairly level and provides excellent cliff top walking. From start to finish you can experience the mining heritage, as well as keeping your eye out for the birdlife and wild flowers. This walk is particularly good for dogs as it passes beaches and pubs where dogs are welcome.



PADSTOW TO HARLYN BAY

6.9 miles Challenging PL28 8AF to PL28 8SB

A long walk, on mostly level terrain, although the route becomes more challenging and rugged after Gun Point. The dramatic coastline around Stepper Point includes an enormous collapsed sea cave at Roundhole Point, and it is a good walk for older children who can do the distance, passing several sandy beaches as well as smugglers caves.
